GMS language arts instructor named 2023 Glenwood Teacher of the Year

Melanie Howard, a language arts instructor at the Glenwood Middle School, has been named the recipient of John A. Gregory Teacher of the Year Award, given annually to a Glenwood Community School District educator.

The award is sponsored by the Glenwood Community Schools Foundation and Farm Bureau Financial Services and named after John B. Gregory, son of the award's namesake.

"The John A. Gregory Teacher of the Year award recognizes and honors teachers who go above and beyond

to meet the needs of Glenwood Community School District students," a press release from the foundation stated. "The award aims to recognize

Dinsmore, Nanfite and Hillyer each received an honorarium award of \$100 from John B. Gregory.

Art Church Revival Project

Exterior restoration planned for historic Art Church in Malvern

The Art Church in Malvern is getting a facelift.

Owner Zack Jones said "critical exterior repairs" are needed to preserve the Victorian Gothic church that was built in 1873.

"There's decorative corners. They just deteriorated to where I've got to replace some wood on them," Jones said. "There's siding that's warped that needs to be taken off and replaced and some trim work (kind of like crown molding). I'm going to try to match it and replace it."

The church is also in need of an exterior paint job. Jones said the exterior was last painted in 2015 with funding Malvern received from a Community Block Development Grant. Jones said the church wasn't prepared properly before being painted that year.

"They painted it in the summer of 2015 and the paint immediately started coming off," he said. "It's to the point where the paint is flaking off in chunks."

"They put it on with an air gun.

They didn't really prep it."

Jones, an artist who has owned the former Presbyterian church since purchasing it from the Malvern Historical Society in 2012, said he understands the amount of work it will take to do the job right.

"The wood that is still intact, I've got a planer that will basically plane it down to fresh, exposed wood so that the primer and paint stick," he said. "A lot of the wood has been exposed for years - the paint just won't stick to it."

The exterior woodwork needs to be mended, scraped, sanded, planed and sealed before being primed and painted. Additionally, the foundation will be patched and the damaged concrete stairs at the front of the building will be replaced and updated to make the church entrance handicap accessible.

Jones is in the process of raising funds to help offset the cost of the repair and renovation work that's expected to begin in May. His goal is to raise \$30,000.

He pointed out that the church has a bell tower that's 54 feet tall.

LGBTQ bills dominate legislative coffee discussion

State Sen. Mark Costello (R) and State Rep. David Sieck (R) heard criticism during Saturday's legislative coffee in Glenwood for their support of legislative bills viewed by opponents as potentially harmful to LGBTQ children.

Last week, Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds (R) signed a "Bathroom Bill" into law as well as legislation which bans gender-affirming care for teens in Iowa. The bathroom bill requires all students to only use restrooms that match the sex they were assigned to at birth.

Opponents believe the two bills, and several other bills introduced in the legislature this session will lead to harassment against LGBTQ children.

Meagan Schnoor, the parent of a trans gender child, called out Costello for a statement he had made at a previous legislative coffee.

"Senator Costello, you said you cannot think of one bill that is anti-LGBTQIA. Senator, as of March 1, there were 29 bills," she said. "Are you completely unaware of what your party is doing?"

Schnoor said Reynolds is

“One of the other big expenses is just renting the lifts,” Jones said. “We’re going to have two different lifts. One is a minimum of 65 feet. We’ll go with an 85 to ensure there’s not going to be an issue. Also, a 32-foot scissor sensor lift for going along the sides to replace and sand and painting the siding.”

The church will be painted a “warm white” color and accented to match the adjacent Art House, also owned by Jones.

The Art Church is a hub of art activity. The sanctuary serves as a studio, gallery and social events venue and the lower level has been turned into an AirBnB.

Financial donations for the Art Church 150-

year Revival Project can be made in person at Malvern Bank, via Venmo at Zack-Jones-82 or through a gofundme account for the project. Jones said all donations will go directly to repair costs and he plans to personally match the donation goal amount. Additional information regarding donations and a link to the gofundme site is available on the Art Church Iowa Facebook page.

Volunteers are also being recruited to assist with masonry and woodwork repairs in May.

Jones said a 150-year celebration for the church is being planned in September in conjunction with the annual Southwest Iowa Art Tour.

“punching down” on LGBTQ children and their parents.

“Governor Reynolds has signed into a law a bathroom bill that prevents children from using the bathroom that aligns with their gender identity and a bill that takes away parental rights for those who seek gender-affirming care. She is punching down. She is hurting those who are fully misunderstood,” Schnoor said.

“Who asked for this? Which constituents? Which doctors. Which psychologists? Which psychiatrists? Which counselors? Which high school educators? With all the troubles for everyday Iowans, who asked you to take away trans children’s rights? Who asked you take away a parent’s ability to make medical decisions for their child. You have weaponized this idea of protecting children to advance this hateful agenda.”

Both Sieck and Costello said they supported the bathroom bill legislation after hearing from parents from “traditional families” who have children that have become uncomfortable using bathrooms and locker rooms with transgender students.

“In the same breath that your child wants the ability to use the restroom or the dressing facilities, there are people that are probably traditionally raised or have a traditional family that has that set of values and you have this set of values. We’re trying to blend that together,” Sieck said. “We have kids not going to the bathroom at all because they’re scared of who’s going to be in that bathroom.”

The bill prohibiting minors to receive gender-affirming surgeries, puberty blockers, and hormone treatment was also addressed by the two

legislators, who both said data suggests many children who elect to change their gender identity later regret it.

“We did pass a bill that will prohibit for minors trans gender surgeries and hormone treatments,” Costello said. “The reason for this is one thing about 80 percent that have gender dysphoria change their minds when they go through puberty.

“There’s long-term research in Sweden where they have found that a person who has trans gender surgery is 19 times more likely than the general population to commit suicide.”

The comment drew groans from several members of the audience and a follow-up response from Candella Foley-Fincham

“Trans people and nonbinary people are more likely to commit suicide, but if you get down and actually talk to people that transition, their reason for wanting to commit suicide isn’t because they transitioned, it’s because they’re still not accepted and people are asking them what bathroom they should be

going to,” she said.

Schnoor disputed the accuracy of Costello’s claim regarding the percentage of trans gender people that change their mind after surgery, stating that research has shown that number to be around 5 percent.

Both Costello and Sieck said their biggest concern is the age of the child making the decision.

“The fact of the matter is a lot of time children regret it. It’s really not something that should be done at that age,” Costello said. “Now, after you’re 18, it’s up to you. We just think that’s inappropriate. They’re sterilized through this treatment. It’s not something that should be decided at that age. It’s a permanent decision. We just don’t think it’s appropriate and we are protecting people from damage.”

A handful of other issues were addressed at the forum, including the need for the state to provide more dollars for the criminal defense fund and potential changes in laws regarding the publication of legal notices by governing bodies.

The buzzards have returned to Glenwood

This is an update of the article I wrote last April for the OT.

Huge flocks of buzzards have returned to our skies, arriving this year a few days early, on March 19.

Again, they have returned to the very same trees along N. Vine St, just across from Northeast Elementary. Get out there and take a look! Now, my story from last year: Since moving to lovely Mills County to spend the remainder of our retirement years in the summer of 2017, I realized the following spring, that our Glenwood neighborhood was the scene of one of nature’s grand spectacles, the Spring return of the Black Turkey Vulture, or known as Buzzards to most in this area.

Routinely, usually near March 22 of each early Spring season, hundreds of these massive birds, with wingspans of about six feet and weighing almost five pounds as mature adults and measuring over two feet long from beak to tail, arrive in the skies over our fair city, not circling about to look for survivors of Covid these days, but to set up shop to clean up our highways of suicidal squirrels, raccoons and opossums, of which this area seems to have an ample supply.

Many years ago, in fact going back nearly 70 years in northeast Ohio, a small town near Cleveland called Hinkley, noted that they also had a large buzzard population that seemed to arrive like clockwork on March 15 each year. Sensing an opportunity to put their small town on the map, a local ornithologist wrote an article in the Cleveland newspaper about this oddity and wouldn’t you know it, about 9000 people came out to see this phenomenon on March 15 of 1957, totally overwhelming the small community.

All local restaurants ran out of food, and well, the locals felt they really weren’t being very good hosts to handle the throng of onlookers. So, the local chamber of commerce decided to capitalize on this craze and organized the now nationally known Buzzard Day celebration.

Held on the first Sunday following the arrival of their guests, there is now a massive pancake and sausage feed (to fund scholarships at the local high school), an Arts & Crafts show, a pet contest and parade, and more, include live buzzard displays and a traveling animal show. Imagine the thrill of winning one of the “Buzzard Scholarships”!

Some people weren’t too happy about celebrating an awkward bird that hisses and grunts and eats carrion only, but hey, when you’re given lemons, don’t you make lemonade? Did I mention, as yet another of their attractive traits, when threatened, they regurgitate their partially digested carrion? Most people don’t really know much about the Black Turkey Vulture, and they really don’t want to, either! But in the wild, they mature at the age of 10 or 11 and live on average for 16 years. In captivity, living to 45 is hardly out of the question.

Pairs court by dancing awkwardly on the ground, where they flap their wings and grunt and jump, and afterwards a usual outcome is two eggs, and quite rarely one or three. Nests are not very organized and can usually be found in rural brushy areas or along steep slopes or cliffs, much as can be found in our Loess Hills. Roosting places overnight are in prominent open branched trees or along a cliff face, sometimes in flocks of over 100 birds. Such are the numbers often seen in tall trees along N. Vine Street, just across from NE Elementary.

Don’t worry, the birds are out cruising the highways for carrion during school hours, so the children are quite safe. Besides, vultures are very picky in their diet – only freshly dead things will do, and they smell such a lovely, fresh scent quite easily as they cruise on the thermal updrafts each afternoon in the area, only to return to their roosts as sunset approaches. Here they spread their wings and let all the collected gore from their day’s work dry off. Pity those whose yards lie beneath these roosting spots. Buzzards have few predators, and this probably explains why just in North America alone, they number around 18,000,000.

During the quiet season for dead roadkill, they live in the southern USA and down through the entirety of Central and South America, but something about the northwestern two thirds of the USA and southern Canada really brings out these large birds’ breeding and nesting instincts. Lacking the normal vocal cords of most birds, they can only hiss and grunt and otherwise endear themselves to the local population. However, aloft over the town, they are an impressive site indeed, especially in the evening as their large groups come back together, circle northern Glenwood and then settle in for the evening.

Seen on the ground, they appear almost totally black, but aloft, their wing feathers have glints of silver and again, they won’t win any beauty contests with the unfeathered red head and throat and a gnarly hooked beak and large talons usually dyed white by well, you know.

I think Glenwood needs a spring festival to compliment the much better-looking fall festivities of Homecoming everyone looks forward to. Think of the tens of thousands Omaha metro residents who would “flock” to Glenwood in late March to see our majestic soaring friends, eat at our fine restaurants and perhaps we could have a Miss Buzzard pageant at Glenwood High and do our own pancake feeds to raise money for local charities and scholarships. C’mon Mills County Chamber of Commerce – let’s get off the roost and start soaring!

What does have a pure heart mean?

Many are familiar with the beatitudes which are a section of a larger discourse spoken by Jesus in His earthly ministry. They are found in His sermon on the mount in Matthew chapter 5, and some of them are mentioned again in the sermon on the plain found in the twentieth chapter of Luke. Both homilies are filled with spiritual wisdom and laid the groundwork for New Testament Christianity. There are also beatitudes found in the Psalms, and all of these truths are timeless and just as life-changing and relevant today as they were when they were spoken. The Greek word for “beatitude” simply means blessed, fortunate, and content, and presented in the context of living each moment with a relentless determination for having a clear understanding of right and wrong and demonstrating boldness to accomplish God’s purpose no matter the cost.

When you think about the condition and direction of your life today, do you see consider yourself being this type of Christian? It’s easy to read over these precepts while yawning, but they were never meant to be options or suggestions. You might have heard the old saying that beatitude is short for “be-in-this-attitude” and this is a good way to make them more personal. When we take the time to meditate on the deeper meanings, we realize they are pillars in the foundation of our faith and our relationship with God and humanity. Today I want to focus on one of these statements found in Matthew 5:8, “Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.” Within the context of the next

two chapters, Jesus is basically teaching us what being His follower is about. Christ is clear about the importance of being holy and pure in our conscience, but how do we develop this attitude and retain it?

As we ponder about the state of being pure, we also notice Jesus mentions the word heart. What do you think of when you hear something like, “well, bless your heart”, “she broke his heart” or “he loved her with all of his heart?” Some say it is the conscience, the emotions, the intellect, and our will, others believe it is the deepest recess of the soul. Whatever, or wherever it is, it is the most sacred place of our existence and the very location that God wants us to surrender to Him so that He can dwell there. Daniel 1:8 talks about how Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself with sin. In this light, we see that it is our responsibility to guard and protect our inner sanctuary from the darkness and corruption of carnality.

The first several chapters of Proverbs explain that we are to store the treasures of God’s word in our hearts and the authority of His truth will produce joy and peace. “My son, attend to my words; incline thine ear to my sayings. Let them not depart from your eyes; keep them in the midst of your heart. For they are life unto

those that find them, and health to all their flesh. Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life” Proverbs 4:20-23. This is about staying focused and being consistent which by the way is one of the most difficult aspects of the Christian life. A pure heart is not divided and as James 1:6-8 reminds us, a double-minded person does not receive help from the Lord. A pure heart for God walks with integrity, repents often, and does not fear what the world thinks of them. A pure heart embraces humility, comprehends and embraces our identity in Christ, and makes a covenant vow to surrender our will in order that we might accomplish His.

It’s a beautiful thing to be close enough to God to feel conviction from the Holy Spirit. This is His way of getting our attention when He wants to correct or give us special instructions. Hebrews 10:22 talks about drawing near to God with a true heart in the full assurance of faith, and having our hearts purified from an evil conscience. Living in God’s presence and being pure in heart does not happen by accident. We see what we are trained to see. May we be awakened and allow the refiner to have His way. Let us be consumed with a passion to be holy, knowing those who are pure in heart will see God.
